We say sorry....


In the higgledy-piggledy ways of life, Lord,

THE WORD OF GOD

First Reading

Romans 13; 8-14

⁸ Owe no one anything, except to love each other, for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. ⁹ For the commandments, "You shall not commit adultery, You shall not murder, You shall not steal, You shall not covet," and any other commandment, are summed up in this word: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." ¹⁰ Love does no wrong to a neighbour; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law.

¹¹ Besides this you know the time, that the hour has come for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed. ¹² The night is far gone; the day is at hand. So then let us cast off the works of darkness and put on the armour of light. ¹³ Let us walk properly as in the daytime, not in orgies and drunkenness, not in sexual immorality and sensuality, not in quarrelling and jealousy. ¹⁴ But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Gospel Reading

Matthew 18; 15 - 20

Jesus said,

¹⁵ "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have gained your brother. ¹⁶ But if he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, that every charge may be established by the evidence of two or three witnesses. ¹⁷ If he refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church.

And if he refuses to listen even to the church, let him be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector.

¹⁸ Truly, I say to you, whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven.

¹⁹ Again I say to you, if two of you agree on earth about anything they ask, it will be done for them by my Father in heaven. ²⁰ For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I among them."

Thanks be to God for these words of life. **Amen.**

Reflection

'Christian' means, a believer in Christ, a follower of Christ, even, 'little Christ'. I like that, 'Little Christ', as in seeking, learning day-by-day to be more like Jesus. Put him on and not just 'talk the talk but walk the walk'.

Writing initially to the Christians in Rome, with guidance on behaviour, in verse 13 St Paul gives examples of activities that they [and the good people of the Camel-Alten Churches] wouldn't want to be seen engaged in during the day, therefore, he urges, don't behave like this at all. Being watched by the puzzled eyes of local unbelievers they / we are to make Jesus known by their / our behaviour; by being different; living attractive lives; advertising Christ's way; doing as our name implies.

Life seems filled with catch phrases; while some used by Politicians are not always helpful; others such as these might be when considering a Christian attitude...

- * 'Be the change you want to see in the world', [attributed to Ghandi]
- * 'It always seems impossible until it's done', [Nelson Mandela]
- * 'Great things are done by a series of small things brought together'. [Vincent Van-Gough]

Christian Love saves; it is deeply powerful and transformative. Paul says: 'Owe no one anything, except to love each other'.

I suspect, he has in mind how Jesus 'condensed' the Ten Commandments into two [well perhaps, three]. To 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and soul and mind' and, 'Love your neighbour as yourself'.

Love is the root of Jesus' word, work, life; he calls 'Little Christians' to live likewise, working out those three basic loves.

Love God - making everything we do and say in his name, for his glory.

Love our neighbour - Jesus is always clear; remembering that everyone is our neighbour, he calls us to SHOW love, DO love, BE love.

And thirdly? To love ourselves, the part often neglected. We cannot give what we do not have. Our ability to love others depends on us loving ourselves - God loves us each way more than we could ever imagine, so much that he took all the negative and

damaging stuff we do and nailed it to a tree in his own Son; that we might freely live; owing nothing....


...but, to love as he first loved us. Keeping to Jesus' example with genuine love for ourselves; we will be enabled to share with all around. It is the least we can do; it's the most we can do. As 'Little Christians', may our neighbours, whether we know them or not, come to know Jesus by the walk we walk.
