For it is good to sing praises to our God; for it is pleasant, and a song of praise is fitting.

Great things He hath taught us, great things He hath done, and great our rejoicing through Jesus the Son; but purer, and higher, and greater will be our wonder, our rapture, when Jesus we see.

Praise the Lord . . .

Gospel Mark 1; 24 – 34 and 35 – 39 and Reflection

With no angels, no stable, no shepherds and not a single wise-man, Mark's Gospel launches in, 'The beginning of the Good News of Jesus Christ, the Son of God', and we meet Jesus the man. By the end of chapter one, Mark has touched on many elements to be further revealed as Jesus' ministry develops.

If likened to politics, it's similar perhaps, to the first days in office. Come April 30^{th,} President Biden, with his feet firmly under the White House desk, will make his 100-day speech, laying out more plans, marking some achievements, outlining challenges, opportunities, initiatives - we know how it goes; tho' whether he turns again to favoured mantras such as, 'Build Back Better', 'No Malarky', or even, 'Not Trump', we wait to hear!

Jesus faces tremendous challenges, opportunities and initiatives. The Jewish people, down-trodden, their land occupied, actions restricted, still keenly seek their Messiah. As we join Jesus now, towards the end of Mark's first chapter, he has been baptised, completed his forty-day wilderness exam, begun to preach and teach; he's called the first disciples, healed a man; and his fame is spreading throughout the area...

²⁹ And immediately Jesus left the synagogue and entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. ³⁰ Now Simon's mother-in-law lay ill with a fever, and immediately they told him about her. ³¹ And he came and took her by the hand and lifted her up, and the fever left her, and she began to serve them.

³² That evening at sundown they brought to him all who were sick or oppressed by demons. ³³ And the whole city was gathered together at the door. ³⁴ And he healed many who were sick with various diseases, and cast out many demons. And he would not permit the demons to speak, because they knew him.

How frustrating for Simon's mother-in-law to know Jesus is in the family home but her illness prevents her looking after him. In this nugget, we see true compassion from Jesus; at her family's request, he goes to her, takes her by the hand, gives his

healing touch and helps her up. In perhaps just a minute or two, she is restored.

Not simply to wait on the men-folk, tho' that's the tradition; but Jesus' healing released her to be herself. It is most likely that service is, for her, a joy; to serve Jesus is a privilege like no other.

Do we know what God wants from us? Who we truly are? He made us with a purpose for each; have we asked what it is? Do we ever allow him to take us by the hand and enable us to fulfil that role, or are we shaped more by the expectations of those around us? If so, can we, dare we seek God's desire, allow him to set us free to do his will, for the furtherance of his kingdom?

Our Gospel continues....

³⁵ And rising very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus departed and went out to a desolate place, and there he prayed. ³⁶ And Simon and those who were with him searched for him, ³⁷ and they found him and said to him, "Everyone is looking for you." ³⁸ And he said to them, "Let us go on to the next towns, that I may preach there also, for that is why I came out." ³⁹ And he went throughout all Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out demons.

Ready for another day of action, the disciples get up in good time. When Jesus doesn't come to breakfast, they wonder why. One goes to wake him, to find his sleeping mat neatly rolled, but no Jesus. Searching, they discover he has been deep in prayer deciding on his next step. A step puzzling for the disciples perhaps - why move on when things are going so well in

Capernaum? Surely Jesus would want to continue there? But Jesus' prayers have confirmed that the obvious thing is not always the best thing.

Despite Mark's almost gallop through the Gospel, the priority of Jesus' solitude, silence and quality time with his Father is not lost. Prayer is how Jesus begins his ministry; makes important decisions; works through troubling emotions; deals with the constant demands on his ministry; gets ready for important events and recovers afterwards; prayer is how Jesus prepares for his death on the cross for us.

For Jesus, prayer is the key to connecting with his Heavenly Father, recharging his Spiritual batteries, working things through, hearing his Father's will. Jesus longs for us to do likewise, and by his example, teaches and encourages us.

The disciples said, 'Lord teach us to pray.'



Loving God, thank you for implanting in us the instincts that lead to prayer. We can't help being thankful, or sorry, or full of wonder, or concerned for someone we know and love. All this is where prayer starts. Help us to trust our instincts and to stretch them out before you regularly, knowing that in this way we'll deepen our relationship with you.

The disciples said, 'Lord teach us to pray.'

Loving God, there are people we care about who have a variety of needs right now, many of whom we can't meet nor touch. To pray for them is the best way we can love them. So, we pray for the people who are on our hearts – in pain, alone, depressed, in hospital, struggling with a difficult situation, mourning the loss of a loved one.... We lift them to you now Lord, for you to touch...

...we bring to God those we know who struggle at this time

The disciples said, 'Lord teach us to pray.'

Loving God, ultimately words are not enough; they crumble to dust in the heat of your presence – they can feel puny and inadequate. Draw us deeper into the stillness of your eternal presence we ask, so that we may know you, or know we have opened our lives to you, or know we have wanted to open our lives to you. Whichever it is, it is enough. Here we are Lord, silently before you...
