Reading - 1 Cor 1.18-25 - Christ the Power and Wisdom of God

¹⁸ For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ¹⁹For it is written,

'I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart.'

²⁰Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? ²¹For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. ²²For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, ²³but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, ²⁴but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. ²⁵For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.



Gospel Reading - John 2.13-22

13 The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. ¹⁴In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money-changers seated at their tables. ¹⁵Making a

whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. ¹⁶He told those who were selling the doves, 'Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a market-place!' ¹⁷His disciples remembered that it was written, 'Zeal for your house will consume me.' ¹⁸The Jews then said to him, 'What sign can you show us for doing this?' ¹⁹Jesus answered them, 'Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up.' ²⁰The Jews then said, 'This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?' ²¹But he was speaking of the temple of his body. ²²After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.



Reflection

We call this incident in our Gospel reading when Jesus turns over the tables of the money changers and merchants, the 'cleansing of the Temple'. Traditionally we have thought of it as a clearing out of the corruption of the market-place: the over-charging and shady dealing, the exploitation of the poor, non of which should have had any place in God's house of prayer. But there is really much more going on here. It is not just these individual practices, but the whole system that has become corrupted and is far from what God intended it to be. The Temple was supposed to both symbolise God's dwelling with Israel for the sake of the world, and graciously provide a way to be forgiven and brought into relationship with him. Instead of this place of inclusion and welcome, it had become instead a place of exclusion - you were only really allowed to take part fully if you were Jewish, male and following the law according to the interpretation of the Priests and Levites - do it any other way and you were left outside.

This startling action of Jesus then, is an acted parable of God's judgement on the temple and what it has become. He is signalling that not just the tables of the moneychangers, but the whole system is about to be turned upside down and superseded by a new means of approaching God, and new means of sins being forgiven: the cross of Jesus.


We've often talked about Lent as being a time for a spiritual spring cleaning: a time to examine our personal lives as individuals and ask: Are we living according to God's design? Are we living by God's instructions or are there things which block God's purposes in our lives that he wants to clear out? There is little value in giving up chocolate or whatever, if we don't give time to this sort of examination and co-operate with the work of God's Spirit within us to cleanse, restore and heal.

But this Gospel story reminds us that our faith is not just individual; there is a communal aspect too. So what might Jesus want to clean out of our church-life this Lent? Are there ways that we have strayed away from the purposes of God for us and got distracted from what he created us to be? Are there things in our churches that get in the way of what God wants to do and what he wants us to do?

Like God's plan for the Temple, the church is meant to be a community where all people can experience and come near to the loving God but sometimes we have created barriers that instead keep people out. What are they and how can we break them down? Sometimes it's the way we do things - and sometimes it's our attitudes to others who maybe don't do things the same way as us that shuts people out.

Lent, and this Lent in particular as we consider re-opening our services soon, is a great opportunity to take some time to prayerfully consider how Jesus might see what we are doing as a church, and the way that we are doing it. To measure ourselves against his standards and purposes and to change what is necessary - with God's help. As you pray and reflect on these questions, I'd love to know what you think - let's start a discussion and work together to make our churches more welcoming, more open to others, more focussed on sharing the love of God in word and deed and let's clear out anything that get in the way of that.

Let's take the opportunity to allow Christ Jesus, the power of God and the wisdom of God, to work in us through his Holy Spirit and enable us to flourish, to develop according to his plans: for his Kingdom to grow in us and through us, and in our life together as a church family this Lent and always.
