The Camel-Allen Churches Easter Sunday Worship at Home



Sunday 4 April 2021

At the start of our services today we light our Paschal candle, bringing in the light of the risen Christ - you might like to light your own Easter candle at home as we rejoice in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus.

Hymn:

Jesus Christ is risen today, *Alleluia*. Our triumphant holy day, *Alleluia*. who did once, upon the cross, *Alleluia*. suffer to redeem our loss. *Alleluia*.

Hymns of praise then let us sing *Alleluia*. unto Christ, our heavenly King, *Alleluia*. who endured the cross and grave, *Alleluia*. sinners to redeem and save. *Alleluia*.

But the pains that he endured *Alleluia*. our salvation have procured; *Alleluia*. now above the sky he's King, *Alleluia*. where the angels ever sing. *Alleluia*.

Bible Reading - Acts 10.34-43 (*This passage is rich in meaning, look for all it tells us about Jesus...*)

³⁴ ... Peter began to speak to them: 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, 35but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. ³⁶You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. ³⁷That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: 38 how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. ³⁹We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; ⁴⁰but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, ⁴¹not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. ⁴²He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. ⁴³All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

Gospel Reading Mark 16.1-8

The Resurrection of Jesus

When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?' When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, 'Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you.' So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.

Reflection

Open Shop

There is great rejoicing in St Teath today – the much loved, much relied upon, much needed village shop is re-opening with a flourish this morning. Good news!

Open Church

Two of our five churches are opening today after lockdown, on this most appropriate of Sunday's of celebration. Thanks to the hard work of scientists, medics, and health-care workers delivering our jabs, and to all in our communities respecting Covid restrictions we can begin to meet together again. Hopefully, despite the continuing restrictions, we can celebrate with joyful worship today whether you are able to join us in person or are joining us in spirit from home. Good news!

Open tomb

Whether in church or at home, what we are supremely celebrating today of course, is the open, empty tomb. When the women arrived in the cool half-light of early morning, they found, despite their worries, that the great stone sealing Christ's burial place had been rolled away. The young man (was it John Mark, our gospel writer as some commentators think?) tells them the startling news, 'He is not

here, he has been raised.' No wonder their first reaction was terror and amazement. But once they had time, together with the other disciples, to piece together the stories and various resurrection experiences, the testimony of the prophets of their history and the words of Jesus himself, they came to realise that far from being terrifying news, the open tomb was Good news – the best!

Good news, because the open tomb declares, as our first reading proclaimed, that 'God raised him on the third day'; that God was at work in and through Christ by anointing him with his Holy Spirit, bringing peace and reconciliation', healing and freedom from oppression. It meant that Jesus was and is the one appointed by God as judge and Lord of all. That everyone, who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.' And this is good news, for all, to every nation!

Open Heart

And yet here 2000+ years on this has too often become just a traditional story, like Cinderella or Jack and the beanstalk, the shocking power of the resurrection has been buried again under Easter bunnies and chocolate eggs. We need open hearts to see and believe, open hearts to receive that peace and reconciliation with God that brings forgiveness of sins and open hearts to enthrone the risen Lord of all at the centre of our lives: to celebrate and share the Good news of the open tomb, open heartedly, with all.
