Readings

Ezekiel 2.1-5



He said to me: O mortal, stand up on your feet, and I will speak with you. ²And when he spoke to me, a spirit entered into me and set me on my feet; and I heard him speaking to me. ³He said to me, Mortal, I am sending you to the people of Israel, to a nation of rebels who have rebelled against me; they and their ancestors have transgressed against me to this very day. ⁴The descendants are impudent and stubborn. I am sending you to them, and you shall say to them, 'Thus says the Lord God.' ⁵Whether they hear or refuse to hear (for they are a rebellious house), they shall know that there has been a prophet among them.

2 Corinthians 12.2-10

²I know a person in Christ who fourteen years ago was caught up to the third heaven—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know; God knows. ³And I know that such a person—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know; God knows— ⁴was caught up into Paradise and heard things that are not to be told, that no mortal is permitted to repeat. ⁵On behalf of such a one I will boast, but on my own behalf I will not boast, except of my weaknesses. ⁶But if I wish to boast, I will not be a fool, for I will be speaking the truth. But I refrain from it, so that no one may think better of me than what is seen in me or heard from me, ⁷even considering the exceptional character of the revelations. Therefore, to keep me from being too elated, a thorn was given to me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to torment me, to keep me from being too elated. ⁸Three times I appealed to the Lord about this, that it would leave me, ⁹but he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness.' So, I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may dwell in me. ¹⁰Therefore I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities for the sake of Christ; for whenever I am weak, then I am strong.

Hymn (from Psalm 121)

I lift my eyes to the quiet hills, in the press of a busy day; as green hills stand in a dusty land, so God is my strength and stay.

I lift my eyes to the quiet hills, to a calm that is mine to share; secure and still in the Father's will and kept by the Father's care.

Gospel Reading Mark 6.1-13

The Rejection of Jesus at Nazareth

He left that place and came to his home town, and his disciples followed him. ²On the sabbath he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astounded. They said, 'Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! ³Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary and brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?' And they took offence at him. ⁴Then Jesus said to them, 'Prophets are not without honour, except in their home town, and among their own kin, and in their own house.' ⁵And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them. ⁶And he was amazed at their unbelief.

The Mission of the Twelve

Then he went about among the villages teaching. ⁷He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. ⁸He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; ⁹but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. ¹⁰He said to them, 'Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. ¹¹If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a

testimony against them.' ¹²So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. ¹³They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.



Reflection

Why do you come to church? Why are you a Christian? How would you answer those questions? Think about it a minute.

Our readings today are all about the struggles of the life of faith:

Ezekiel had an encounter with God in a vision and was sent to the people of Israel with a message: *'I am sending you to them, and you shall say to them...'* They won't listen to you, he is told, but go anyway – not very engouraging!

In 2 Corinthians, Paul, the great evangelist and teacher of the faith, talks about the ups and downs of faith, mountain-top experiences and the depths of despair in living for God.

In our gospel reading Jesus spends his time teaching in the synagogue, we read, ⁵And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them and they took offence at him. The people wouldn't listen despite the miracles!

Nevertheless, Jesus sends his disciples out to share the Good News even though he knows they too will experience rejection - they need to be prepared for the fact that some will not welcome them and will refuse to hear them.

We too are tasked with passing on the Good News of God's love and grace shown to us in Christ Jesus. At the end of Matthew's gospel we have the great commission:

'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.'

Despite the fact that many won't listen to us, many will reject what we say and stand for, some may ridicule and persecute even (though thankfully not here where we are) but we are to go anyway.

1 Peter 3.15 says: 'but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defence to anyone who demands from you an account of the hope that is in you'

Why? because the love of God compels us – because those who don't yet know his love are 'worth it' to God. We go and share out of obedience to God, because we are told to. We go because of the benefits of knowing God we want other to share. We go because without growth and newcomers our churches will die.

I came across this story in a reflection on this passage (Reflections for Sunday's Year B Proper 9 by Peter Graystone)

'I was on a bus, sitting behind two mature ladies whose conversation I couldn't help overhearing. One said, 'Our grandson will be christened on Sunday.' The other said, 'I forgot you go to church. Why are you a Christian?'

'Oh, you can't possibly ask me that,' said the first. 'You'd have to ask the vicar.' I was willing her to say something positive and was delighted when she added, 'I do find the services peaceful'.

'Ah, peace,' replied her friend. 'You should come to my Pilates class. It's the most peaceful point in my week.' To my dismay the conversation ended with the Christian lady writing down the date of the exercise class in her diary, not the other one being invited to the baptism.'

Could that be us? How would you respond if someone asked you why you believe, or why you go to church? We need to be prepared to tell others about the hope that is in us. And if our services aren't occasions we can invite others to then we need to change them.

Do you feel you can't do it? Don't give up, we have that promise in our reading from 2 Corinthians, *'my strength is made perfect in weakness'* we rely on the Holy Spirit of God to work in us and with us. In his strength and with his help, we can.
